MODEST AND STYLISH

Our Lady of Good Success appeared in Quito, Ecuador in the 17th Century with a message of warning for the end of the 19th Century and especially the 20th Century. The following words are taken from this Church approved apparition: "In these unhappy times, there will be *unbridled lust* which, acting thus to snare the rest into sin, will conquer innumerable frivolous souls who will be lost. *Innocence will almost no longer be found in children, nor modesty in women.*"

Jacinta Marto, one of the little seers of Fatima, said with regard to styles of dress: "Fashions will arise which will greatly offend God. Those who keep the Law of God should not follow fashions. (...) The sins that lead more souls to hell are the sins of the flesh."

On January 12, 1930, the Sacred Congregation of the Council (now called the Congregation for the Clergy), by order of Pope Pius XI, issued a document which concludes with these words: "Maidens and women dressed immodestly are to be *debarred from Holy Communion* and from acting as sponsors at the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation; further, if the offense be extreme, they may even be **forbidden to enter the church.**"

Detailed instructions on women's modesty had already been issued on September 24, 1928, by the Cardinal Vicar of Rome, cardinal Basilio Pompili: "We recall that *a dress cannot be called decent* which is cut deeper than **two fingers' breadth under the pit of the throat**, which does not cover the arms at least to the elbows, and scarcely *reaches a bit beyond the knee*. Furthermore, dresses of transparent material are **improper.**"

In an allocution to young Catholic girls (May 22, 1941), Pope Pius XII stated: "Numbers of believing and pious women...in accepting to follow certain bold fashions, break down, by their example, the resistance of many other women to such fashions, which may become for them the cause of spiritual ruin. As long as these *provocative styles* remain identified with women of doubtful virtue, good women do not dare to follow them; but once these styles have been accepted by *women of good reputation*, decent women soon follow their example, and are carried along by the tide into possible disaster."

To say that "*modesty is a matter of custom*" is just as wrong as to say that "*honesty is a matter of custom.*"



Addressing a Congress of the "Latin Union of High Fashion" in November 8, 1957, Pope Pius XII declared: "No matter how broad and changeable the relative morals of styles may be, *there is always an absolute norm to be kept* after having heard the admonition of conscience warning against approaching danger: *style must never be a proximate occasion of sin.*"

Saint Paul, infallibly inspired by God, tells us: "*Know you not that your members are the temple of the Holy Ghost, Who is in you, Whom you have from God, and you are not your own?... Glorify and bear God in your body.*" (1 Cor. 6:19-20).
